STATE BOARD OF REGISTRATION

The State Board of Registration met in Reno on June 2. Clare Schmutz was elected Chairman and Art Warden Secretary. The new appointee, David Drew, was quite active and interested in the procedures of the Board. As always, Dr. Hahn was not present.

As decided at the Tonopah meeting, a committee composed of Al Alcorn, Fred Picard and Ed Bohdan drafted a letter to the Board on matters of registration, fees and the composition of the Board in line with the thinking of the majority of the membership. The Board was unable to act on any of these proposals due to evidently insufficient time to consider them and to some lingering confusion on details of some of the proposals. The Sec.Treas. was directed to re-draft a letter setting forth in explicit detail the proposals of the Association and to present it within 60 days. A petition has also been instituted requesting another meeting of the

Board on September 27 in Elko during the Nevada Public Health Association meeting. Most everyone agrees that the proposals will be settled once and for all at that time.
